Summit resident tells board she's concerned about crime

A Summit resident who was the victim of recent vandalism told town officials Tuesday that while she appreciates the work of police, she'd like to see stricter enforcement of the town's curfew and stepped-up patrols.

Queen Monley said her yard was vandalized over the July 4 weekend. She said flower pots, a bird bath and two metal tiger yard ornaments were damaged.

She noted that there are two Neighborhood Watch signs on her street "but nobody saw what happened" to her yard.

Monley said she tries to keep a lookout for suspicious

- Authorized Percy Robinson to sign documents relating to the wastewater facilities project.

- Held a public hearing, after which they declared the property at 310 Peters St. a public health hazard
